

REMEMBERING OUR FALLEN FIRE FIGHTERS

As for me, the month of February has not been the same since the year 2000. It had not been long since all the hype took place concerning the new Millenium. There was a lot of concern about all the computers in the world crashing, and as for my wife and I, we were on an Amtrak train going across the state of Utah at the beginning of the year 2000. My friend, Jo, told me prior to our trip that at 12:01 a.m. January 1, 2000 our train would stop dead in its tracks and we would be doing the stuck-out-in-nowwhere thing. Well that did not happen and for the most part ringing in the year 2000 was pretty much uneventful.

The calendar then ticked down to Monday, February 14th, Valentine's Day. Those of us not working the night before woke up to the news that the roof of a burning McDonalds Restaurant collapsed and killed two of our Fire Fighters. The two Fire Fighters, both crew members of Engine 76, located in the far Southwest section of Houston, were gone. The first Fire Fighter who perished was Lewis Mayo, age 45. He died when the roof of the restaurant collapsed. The second Fire Fighter, Kim Smith, age 30, died after being trapped in the back of the restaurant and was not able to escape.

Less than one month after we buried Kim and Lewis, I received a call that a scrapbook containing newspaper clippings had been found and turned over to HFD. The scrapbook belonged to Chief Grover Adams who was a member of the HFD from 1915 to 1960.

The book contained an article from *The Houston Press* containing information about a fire at a lamp oil company near downtown Houston. During the fire, a wall collapsed killing one Fire Fighter and injuring several others. The Fire Fighter's name was H. A. "Ace" Harris, age 48, who had been a Houston Fire Fighter for 2 weeks. His name, lost from our records for 79 years, suddenly became new addition to Houston's Line-of-Duty list. Then to add to my surprise of finding the new name, the date that H. A. Harris died was February 14th, Valentine's Day 1921.

The month of February then became my official least favorite month. Then there was the year 2005. Once again, a pretty uneventful beginning of the New Year. Valentine's Day came around, and that year had become the 5th anniversary of the death of Kim and Lewis and the 84th anniversary of H. A. Harris. However we were not able to escape February 2005 without having another reason to dread the month. On the early morning of the 19th we lost another Fire Fighter. Grady Burke, age 39, Captain on Engine 46, died while fighting a house fire. Ironically, the roof of the house collapsed trapping Captain Burke and injuring several crew members of Fire Station 46.

Now, in closing, my point to all of this, even though the month of February is not a personal favorite, is that each month of each year on the anniversary of their death we remember all 60 of the Line-of-Duty Fire Fighters who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

Also remember the family members and friends and especially the children of these Fire Fighters that have had to grow up or are in the process of growing up without their parent.

This month I am honored to print a poem written by Grady Burke's oldest daughter, Hannah. She wrote this poem for school last year at the age of 12.


