

REMEMBERING OUR FALLEN FIRE FIGHTERS

I was deeply saddened by the news of the passing of a long-time Fire Fighter friend that I have known for over 30 years. He died on Saturday, September 20th, a week after Hurricane Ike. He was hospitalized the Friday that Ike was bearing down on us and died a week later.

I met him on my first assignment as a newly promoted Chauffeur in October of 1978. My new assignment was Station 28 A Shift, driving Engine 28.When I walked in that morning, I saw him sitting on the end of one of the two couches in the lounge drinking his morning coffee. I later figured out that he was in the same seat on that couch if he was not cooking, cleaning or making a run. Most of us, out of respect, did not sit there and some of us would conveniently forget to tell "the rookie" not to sit there. The name of this Fire Fighter is John Dixie Fisher, or better know as J. D.

I would now like to introduce J. D.'s oldest son, Kelly, who has been a Houston Fire Fighter since 1983.



Dad lost his father when he was only a boy, about 6 years old, and was raised by his mother who he dearly loved. Dad was what you might characterize as a neighborhood hoodlum and dropped out of school in the 6th graded. His mother didn't become aware that he has dropped out of school until a year later. He shined shoes up and down Washington Avenue and even retrieved golf balls out of the ponds at the Memorial Park Golf Course to sell back to the golfers.

He met my mother, Darlene, where she lived just west of downtown in San Felipe Courts in 1951. They got married after he was drafted and completed boot camp for the U. S. Army in 1952. Three days later he left for Korea where he was assigned to an amphibious unit based out of Iwo Jima and shuttled Marines and Soldiers to the beaches of Korea. After two years in Korea, he came home and went to work for Gulf Oil, painting and rebuilding gas pumps.

In 1958, his first child, Kim, was born and later that year he was laid off at Gulf Oil and decided to join the Houston Fire Department. In order to meet the weight requirements, which at that time was a minimum body weight of 130 pounds, he put lead plates and lots of change into his back pockets. He completed his fire training in 1960 and was assigned to old Station 28's on Westheimer, where the 30 year legend of J. D. Fisher began. I was born in 1962 and 11 months later my brother, Kevin, was born.

My dad shared with me many "war stories" at old 28's where he drove the late Chief Max McRae for 12 years. He prided himself on the ability to remain calm and collective on the radio during many of the large fires they made together. My dad watched Station 28 become one of Houston's busiest fire stations. He met many of his great friends while working at 28's for 30 years. Friendships that he spoke about to his family frequently after he retired in 1990. He never had quite the same enthusiasm about going to work after Chief Claude Jahnke, Jay Jahnke's father, passed away after having a massive heart attack in June of 1984. Their friendship dated back to when they were both teenagers running around the west end of Houston together.

My dad had a reputation of harassing brother Fire Fighters, and especially enjoyed harassing Chiefs and Rookies. I was told that he would go out of his way to on Deputy Chief pick Crowder, who was also assigned to Station 28, and any other Chief that came by the station. As far as station rookies were concerned, he would not acknowaged or talk to them for at least a year!

When I was a rookie myself I rode for one of my friends who was assigned to Station 28 on the same shift as Dad. This was quite a thrill for me to be able to work with him. After Roll Call that morning a couple of the Fire Fighters pulled me off to the side and asked me if J. D. was talking to me. They explained to me that J. D. would not speak to them. I started to laugh and explained that he did not have a choice since I was his son! I also let them know tha he was messing with them because they were rookies. Most of those men became life-long friends with my father.

I was very blessed to have a father who was not only my best friend, but who cared the world for his family and friends. We spent a lot of time together over the years, especially hunting the brush country in South Texas and Old Mexico. I was fortunate to hunt with him one more season in 2007-2008 in Mexico, months before he passed away. I knew he was gradually slipping away from us. It was one of the most difficult things to experience, to watch my hero's health progressively get worse and worse. I am still struggling with the loss of my father, even though the quality of life he had at the end was horrible. It was a blessing that the Lord took him home. My Dad had great faith. He was a Christian man who loved the Lord and his family. He set an example to be a man of integrity, take care of your family and to love the Lord with all of your heart.

Daddy, I know you told me to have a good cry and move on but I miss you very much. Thanks for always being there for me, my wife and children. We love you "Old Man!"



In closing this month's article, I would like to say some words to I D.

May your journey in Heaven be as profound as your journey on Earth. "God Speed" John Dixie Fisher, there are not words to describe how much I will miss you.
